Mark 2:4 Adaptive Worship Service

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Welcome! Today we follow Christ is his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love.

There are a few things to know about this service: you are not required to stand at any point though you can move around anytime you want or need, prayer slips are available for your prayers to be included in Prayer Time, and Holy Communion is served with gluten-free bread and grape juice.

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#### **GREETING**

Worship Leader: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

Congregation: And also with you.

#### PRAYER OF THE DAY

# FIRST READING Philippians 2:5-11

Introduction to the Lesson: Paul quotes from an early Christian hymn that describes Jesus' humble obedience in his incarnation as a human being, even to death, and his exaltation and glory as Lord of all.

Reader: 5 The attitude you should have is the same one that Christ Jesus had:

- 6 He always had the nature of God,
  - but he did not think that by force he should try to remain equal with God.
- 7 Instead of this, of his own free will he gave up all he had, and took the nature of a servant.
- He became like a human being and appeared in human likeness.
- 8 He was humble and walked the path of obedience all the way to death—

his death on the cross.

- 9 For this reason God raised him to the highest place above and gave him the name that is greater than any other name.
- 10 And so, in honor of the name of Jesus all beings in heaven, on earth, and in the world below will fall on their knees,

11 and all will openly proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

After the reading...

Reader: The word of the Lord. Congregation: Thanks be to God.

#### GOSPEL LESSON Luke 19:28-40

Introduction to the Gospel: Jesus enters Jerusalem in the manner that the prophets fore-told. Within a week, however, the loud acclamations would become shouts of rejection.

Worship Leader: The Holy Gospel according to Luke in the 19th chapter.

Congregation: Glory to you, O Lord.

Pastor: 28 After Jesus said this, he went on in front of them toward Jerusalem. 29 As he came near Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, he sent two disciples ahead 30 with these instructions: "Go to the village there ahead of you; as you go in, you will find a colt tied up that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. 31 If someone asks you why you are untying it, tell him that the Master needs it."

- 32 They went on their way and found everything just as Jesus had told them. 33 As they were untying the colt, its owners said to them, "Why are you untying it?"
- 34 "The Master needs it," they answered, 35 and they took the colt to Jesus. Then they threw their cloaks over the animal and helped Jesus get on. 36 As he rode on, people spread their cloaks on the road.
- 37 When he came near Jerusalem, at the place where the road went down the Mount of Olives, the large crowd of his disciples began to thank God and praise him in loud voices for all the great things that they had seen: 38 "God bless the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory to God!"
- 39 Then some of the Pharisees in the crowd spoke to Jesus. "Teacher," they said, "command your disciples to be quiet!"
- 40 Jesus answered, "I tell you that if they keep quiet, the stones themselves will start shouting."

Worship Leader: The gospel of the Lord. Congregation: Praise to you, O Christ.


# **GOSPEL MESSAGE—From Sundays and Seasons Getting Our Hopes Up**

Many of us were warned when we were young, "Don't get your hopes up," in case the things we were hoping for and working toward didn't come to fruition. "Why open yourself up to the sting of disappointment?" is the practical wisdom contained in this common aphorism.

When Jesus went into Jerusalem and was greeted by the joyous crowds, he knew it would lead to the cross. It doesn't take divine omniscience to understand that stirring up populist sentiment and openly confronting political authorities does not often end well. The suffering and death that Jesus was set to experience was the opposite of what the crowd hoped for him, and it may be the opposite of what we think we want in a messiah too. But the hope offered by Jesus in his suffering and death, while different than what we might expect, never disappoints. God's promise embodies life that is stronger than the shadow of death. Even amid fear and betrayal and torture, God will bring about healing. Even amid the finality of death, God will bring resurrection and new life.

As we come to the close of our Lenten journey, we can confidently keep our hopes up, knowing that the new world being born in God will never disappoint. It may look nothing like we expect or dream about, but we can trust that God's work will always defy our expectations in ways that are more life-giving and world-transforming than we could ever imagine for ourselves. So, get your hopes up! God's work will never let you down.


**Congregation: Amen.**
